In company with County Superintendent Wilhite an inspection of your elementary schools was made on October 15th. Since my visit of last year I was pleased to learn that a supervisor of music has been added to the teaching force; a nurse has been employed for part time in the grades.

Superintendent Ogg informed me that supplementary readers would be supplied in all of the grades in sets of 20. These supplementary readers will cover such subjects as history, geography, science and literature.

The walls and ceilings should be redecorated in two of the buildings. Slate blackboards should be provided for two of the buildings. This should be done as soon as possible.

Since my visit of last year whether strips have been used at the main building.

We found one of the classrooms with double seats very much crowded. The suggestion was made to Superintendent Ogg that it would be a good plan to use the unoccupied room down stairs. This is a much larger room and lighted in a more satisfactory way.

I was glad to be informed that the board of education places a premium on teacher preparation. All of the teachers who did not attend summer school a year ago were in school this last summer vacation. Anything that is done to improve the teaching force is a good investment in the elementary schools.

I hope this will be the very best year in the history of the Gillespie elementary schools.

That, of course, is a question to be worked out by the Superintendent and the board of education.

My dear Mr. Cameron:

I am pleased to send you this report upon the visit I made to your schools on January 24 in company with Mr. Wilhite, your county superintendent of schools.

First of all, I want to congratulate your district upon the appearance of your school buildings. The recent work upon them has put them in excellent condition. I am sure teachers and pupils appreciate their neat, attractive surroundings. Your janitor service is better than average.

Your classes are of good size to permit teachers to give attention to the individual needs of their pupils. I am glad that you have some men teachers in your upper grades. Boys and girls of the seventh and eighth grades need to come in contact with strong teachers of both sexes.

It means much to your pupils to have the opportunity to play in a band. I hope before long your board will be able to employ the band director instead of having him paid by parents of the members of the band.

Your superintendent told me about the excellent work which the nurse did in your schools last year. I hope your efforts to secure similar nursing service for the remainder of this year will be successful. A good nurse is a great asset to any school system.

I have the following suggestions for the improvement of your schools:

1. Most of your teachers do not have the two years of training beyond high school graduation commonly considered a minimum requirement for teachers of the elementary grades. Trained teachers are plentiful and the children of Gillespie deserve the best. In filling future vacancies I think your board should insist that your superintendent recommend only applicants with the full amount of training. Also teachers now in your system who have less than two years may well be asked to attend summer school as soon as you are able to pay your teachers in cash.

2. Your school year is very short and should be lengthened as soon as your finances will permit. Four months of a year is too much vacation for school children.

3. Many of the textbooks used in your schools are obsolete and should be replaced with more modern texts. If not more than one book is changed a year, the expense to your patrons is not great.

4. There is a need for additional reading material in your lower grades and reference books in your upper grades. I trust you will be able to authorize Supt. White to make the necessary purchases soon.

5. Many school systems no longer use dark oil on the school house floors. The oil darkens the floor, tends to hold the dirt, and to increase the fire hazard. I suggest that you consider the advisability of having your floors thoroughly scrubbed (two or three times) and then treated with a good seal. The seal should last for several years, but will need to be waxed occasionally.

6. When your finances permit, slate blackboards should be installed in your Big Brick building. Also there is more blackboard than necessary in some of your classrooms, but a great shortage of bulletin board for display purposes. I suggest that you cover some of the least used board with celotex, or some other porous wall board, to provide inexpensive bulletin boards.

It was a pleasure to discuss the problems of your schools with your superintendent. I am convinced that Supt. White is familiar with modern school standards and is providing desirable leadership for the teachers and pupils of your school system.

Dear Mr. Hoehn:

I have your letter of September 25 addressed to Mr. Moore, who is no longer connected with the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Since you have increased your enrollment in the special class for crippled children, I am enclosing preliminary application blanks which should be filled out and returned to this office. I suggest that you fill out these blanks completely, including all three crippled children who are enrolled in the special class. I think you are using good judgment in having the children produce doctors' certificates to establish proof of their physical condition.

The law defines a crippled child as one between the ages of five and twenty-one who is crippled in body or limb and who cannot profitably or safely attend the regular school. The state will pay the district the excess cost, which is the difference between the actual per capita cost of educating a normal child and the actual per capita cost of educating a crippled child. The excess cost must in no case exceed \$300 per individual for a school year's work. Of course, if insufficient funds have been appropriated by the legislature, the amount will be prorated among all the districts in the state which have bona fide claims for crippled children. The legislature has recently increased the appropriation from \$100,000 to \$400,000 per year.

My dear Mr. White:

In company with your county superintendent, Mr. Kerstein, I had a very pleasant visit in your schools on Thursday, May 14. I am pleased to report that the schools seemed to be moving along in a very splendid way and I think you, your board and teachers are to be commended for some of the splendid things which you are doing. I shall not take time to list some of these matters that are receiving your attention in a fine way but shall make a few suggestions for the continuance of a good school system. I realize that your finances may prevent the carrying out of some of these suggestions but I am making them hoping you will be able to do at least a part of them.

School Plant and Sanitation. Some of the walls are getting in rather bad condition especially in the Little Brick school. This condition may be remedied by washing of the walls but no doubt a good coat of paint would be much more satisfactory. Some of the blackboards in the Big Brick school are in very bad condition. I am hoping that you will be able to install some new slate boards. You need a good sized bulletin board in each room. We recommend as a minimum size fifteen square feet for each room. I was glad to note that you are treating your floors with a floor filler and seal rather than using floor oil. The only suggestion which I have in regard to this is that many times too high prices may be charged for such materials. I think some investigation will show you that there are many different prices for such materials.

Instructional Equipment. In order for an elementary school to come up to standard they need certain instructional equipment. This includes such items as maps, globes, charts, supplementary readers, reference encyclopedias, etc. I hope you will be able to give some attention to the supplying of these necessary items of instructional equipment.

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Preparation of Teachers. I was glad to note that there was some outstanding work being done by your teachers. I have one suggestion to make and that is that you hold the standards rather high for beginning teachers. I believe that two year minimum preparation is the very lowest that should be considered by an elementary school. Even three or four years preparation is very fine for beginning teachers. Of course, experienced teachers is a different problem. In most cases years of experience will make up for deficiencies in preparation.

Program of Study. I am hoping that you will be able to add music and art to your curriculum for next year. I believe that no elementary school pupil should be without training in these two fields. As I explained to Mr. White I believe that the distributive law will take care of the expense of this additional feature for next year.

I think that you and your board are to be commended for the attempt to keep your textbooks up-to-date. I am of the opinion this is quite essential for a good school.

Again I wish to assure you that it was, indeed, a pleasure to have a day's visit with you and to observe some of the splendid work that is being done in your elementary schools and much of it I realize is in the face of serious financial handicaps. Be assured that this office is always ready and willing to give any possible assistance.
