Dear Sirs:

In company with County Superintendent Wilhite an inspection of your elementary schools was made on October 16th. Since my last visit I was glad to know that a music supervisor has been added to the teaching force. Work in sewing has been installed in the 7th and 8th grades for the girls. The walls and ceilings at the north school have been redecorated. The color is not a very good one. It is too intensely yellow but it has improved the interior of the building, nevertheless.

The roof at the south building is in need of repair. The leaks are causing damage to the ceilings. As soon as this question is remedied the walls and ceilings at this building should be redecorated. If you will follow the suggestions in our circular 182 the results will be very satisfactory. Under separate cover I am sending one of these #182 to your superintendent.

Your superintendent, Mr. Sparr, informed me that 21 of your teachers out of 29 were in school last summer. This was the very finest thing he could have told me. The board of education is placing a premium on teacher preparation. There is nothing that will do so much for your schools as a policy of this kind. The fact, that the teachers had been attending school was in evidence in the different classrooms. I wish to commend the board of education, Superintendent Sparr and teachers for this forward step.

Everything points to a successful year in your elementary schools.

September 24th, in company with County Superintendent Wilhite, a brief inspection of your elementary schools was made.

Since our visit of last year I noted that the walls and ceilings in the junior high school have been redecorated. The color scheme has a little too much pink in it but nevertheless the rooms are greatly improved in appearance and cheerfulness.

In one of the buildings the walls and ceilings have been redecorated in the last year or two but the color scheme followed has too much yellow. Under separate cover I am sending you one of our circular #182. If you will follow the plan suggested in this circular you will find the results very satisfactory. The walls should be a very light tan and the ceilings a very light cream color.

The enrollment in the Stamton elementary schools is not so large this year as previous years but still you have plenty of children. The thing to do is to give them the very best chance possible.

The suggestion made to Superintendent Sparr was to build up his library. Quite a good deal has been done along that line but every year there should be new books added in the form of supplementary readers, reference books, general library books, etc.

I was pleased to note that at one of the buildings new toilets have been installed. For this good work I wish to commend the board of education.

Everywhere we found good order and a fine spirit of cooperation on the part of Superintendent Sparr, teachers and children. All indications are that you will have a successful school year in the Stamton elementary schools.

Two of the rooms were redecorated. It is to be hoped that this good work can be completed during the next summer vacation.

The school is well organized. Superintendent Sparr informed us that you have 4 fewer teachers than you had last year but in no room did we find an over crowded condition.

Not only the elementary schools but the high school.

My dear Mr. Burns:

With your County Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Wilhite, I visited your schools on January 22nd. I am sending the following report for the consideration of your Board of Education and Superintendent:

First of all, I want to compliment your board upon the work done upon your buildings last year. I am sure teachers and pupils appreciate their clean and attractive surroundings. Your janitor service is good, especially in the north building.

A majority of your teachers have the two years of training beyond high school graduation commonly considered a minimum requirement for teachers of the elementary grades. In filling all vacancies, your board should insist that your superintendent recommend only applicants with the full amount of training.

Also, as soon as your financial condition will permit, it would be wise to continue the policy which I understand you once followed, of asking teachers to attend summer school every two or three years and giving them a small bonus for such attendance. This is an excellent method of keeping your teachers up-to-date along educational lines.

Most of your classes are of good size to expect teachers to secure satisfactory results. One third grade class in the south building is much too large, having an enrollment of forty-eight. If possible, some means should be found to reduce the enrollment in this room, or to give the teacher some help, if only for part time.

I am glad that you employ a music supervisor and that your pupils have the opportunity to play in an orchestra. Training in music will be a help to your children when they go to high school and after they leave school.

Mr. Henry Burns - #2

I have these additional suggestions for the improvement of your schools:

1. Each spring I think your board and superintendent should prepare an itemized budget for the following year. It is good business to estimate receipts and expenditures in advance and help in the distribution of funds.

2. Also I think your board should adopt a regular monthly meeting date to listen to the report of your superintendent, to pass upon all bills, and to transact other school business.

3. When a vacancy occurs in your upper grades, I think you should consider the advisability of employing another man teacher. A good man in the upper grades would be a great asset, especially in working with the boys.

4. There is a need for a nurse in your schools. Possibly some plan may be worked out to secure a nurse for one day a week. In many school systems the nurse also serves as attendance officer.

5. Some of your textbooks are much out of date and should be replaced with modern texts. If the texts in one subject are changed each year, it does not cause a hardship to the parents. I am sure Supt. Curtis and the teachers will be glad to recommend desirable texts.

6. I am glad your district makes a practice of buying the State Reading Circle books each year. There is a great need in your schools for modern reference books and maps for the work in geography and history. I trust you will be able to authorize Supt. Curtis to make the necessary purchases soon.

7. In your North building, a new modern urinal should be placed in the boys' toilet room.

I enjoyed talking about your schools with your superintendent. I am confident Mr. Curtis is much interested in all departments of your school system and working for the best interests of the boys and girls.

I have your letter in regard to the closing of one of your school buildings. Legally the question of establishing and maintaining attendance units within the school district is entirely within the authority of the school board. It is their responsibility.

If you feel that the building is unsafe the only way in which a proper inspection can be secured is for you to confer with your county superintendent of schools. If he feels that the building is unsafe or unfit for occupancy, he has the legal power to request the State Architects Office to make an inspection of the building. Therefore, I suggest that you see your county superintendent of schools.

Gentlemen:

On the sixteenth of March I visited the Staunton Elementary School, District #155. Your principal, Mrs. Jessie Sparr, is well qualified and experienced for her work. I think she is doing an excellent job. You have a very capable faculty that are all well qualified and experienced in their work. I hope that you will continue with your salary schedule and, if possible, give them an extra bonus during this period of high cost of living, (Increases from 25% to 47% by Babson) so that they will stay in your system.

I want to congratulate you upon the interest you have taken in the school. The remodeling you did in the building not only makes it look very attractive but adds to the atmosphere of the school. The new floors that were put in are a valuable addition. They should be given a good floor-sealed treatment and varnished, and then varnished at least twice a year. This will make them look much better and they will be easier to clean.

If your permanent seats were taken up and put on boards, four seats to a board, they could be moved around and it would be much easier for the janitor to clean the floor.

I was particularly interested in your music program. I think Mrs. Fischer is doing an excellent job. If you find it possible to have an art supervisor in the school and also a physical training supervisor for both boys and girls on the same basis as the music supervisor, it would be a very valuable addition. I might suggest in this connection if you would re-surface a part of the playground so that the children could play out of doors when the ground is muddy it would be a great help. This could be done by using concrete, asphalt, or oiling it after it has been thoroughly drained or tiled. Some schools pay one of their teachers an extra fee for supervising the playground during the noon and recess hours.

Although you have a good academic program worked out in the lower grades and the junior high school, and you have made some effort for the domestic training of your girls in the way of sewing, there is still a lot to be done. The large, four-room building you have on the ground could be used to a great advantage by remodeling it. One room might be used for a playroom or practice room for basketball. Another room could be made into a general shop for woodworking or metal work. Another could be converted into a Home Economic room for cooking and sewing, while another could be used as a kind of auditorium with a stage at one end and seats where programs and moving pictures could be put on. In connection with this, a number of schools have their own moving picture machine and have very valuable educational programs by using films from the University of Illinois.

The above remarks are merely suggestions. You have done such a good job in Staunton that I would not think of telling you what to do, as you know the needs of your community and the amount of funds available. I might say that Gillespie and Mt. Olive both have worked out a pretty good vocational program for their children and it might be worth your while to send a committee to these schools to investigate. The demands of boys and girls to meet competition in the world are much greater now than they have been in the past. Although the enrollment is much less than it formerly was, your children are just as deserving of the best as any others are. I am sure that you will do the most for them that you can.
