I hope you will give him all the encouragement possible in solving this problem.

We were well pleased with the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of Superintendent Ketring, teachers and children. You were doing well last year but your school is even better this year.

My dear Mr. Welch:

I take pleasure in sending you this report upon the visit I made to the elementary grades of your school on January 23rd in company with Mr. Wilhite, your County Superintendent of Schools.

Your community is to be congratulated upon its beautiful building. I am sure teachers and pupils must enjoy their attractive surroundings.

You have a group of well trained teachers. The plan of your board of education of asking teachers to attend summer school every second year is an excellent method to keep teachers familiar with new ideas in education.

Most of your classes are of good size. If possible, no teacher should be asked to have more than forty pupils in her room at any time.

I have a number of suggestions for the consideration of your board and superintendent.

1. With all of his administrative and supervisory duties, it seems to me your superintendent needs the help of an office clerk for at least one or two half days a week. It is poor business to pay a superintendent to attend to routine matters which a clerk at a comparatively small salary could take care of efficiently.

2. Your pupil records are unsatisfactory. Your superintendent should introduce a card or loose-leaf system and have a modern filing case in which all records may be kept.

3. When a change is made in teachers, I suggest that you consider a man teacher for the upper grades. There are many ways in which a good man may help in the conduct of the school, especially in working with boys from the seventh and eighth grades.

4. There is a need for additional reading material in your lower grades and reference books in the upper grades. Mr. Rich will be glad to select the books most needed.

5. When funds are available, I think your district should introduce work in music in the school. Training in music, both vocal and instrumental, is a great asset to boys and girls and will mean much to them after they leave school.

6. The blackboards in the front of your class rooms in the lower grades are too high from the floor and should be lowered. It would be well to place bulletin boards at the top of these boards and also at the sides of the blackboards. The bulletin boards are greatly needed for display purposes. An inexpensive bulletin board may be provided by using celotex or some other porous wall board.

7. Some of the pupils' desks are in poor condition. The tops should be sanded and varnished with a dull finish which will not give a glare to the eyes.

8. Some of the partitions in the boys' toilet room have been marked and scratched. I suggest that the janitor be provided with paint like that in the toilet rooms, and immediately paint over any disfiguring. I think this will stop the practice.

9. Within a year or two, I think your building should be decorated. The ceilings should be made a white or cream color and the walls a light tan. If you prefer, the lower part of the walls may be a somewhat darker tan than the upper part.

I enjoyed talking with your superintendent about your school. I am confident that Mr. Rich is giving attention to the details of his work and seeking to maintain high educational standards.

CONCERNING THIS SANITARY ANALYSIS

The statements on the reverse side are based not only on the analytical results, but also on the description of the source as furnished by you or already on file in this office. It is further recommended as follows:

- (a) If the water is unsafe to drink, abandon the supply for one of known safety or bring the water to a boil before use, until the suggested improvements have made the supply safe.
- (b) If the source is not satisfactory, make the suggested improvements immediately.
- (c) If the water is safe, take care to keep it safe by protecting the supply against contamination.

A laboratory examination of the water has been made to show the presence or absence of waste matter of human or animal origin. If the water is contaminated by surface wash or sewage, then parasitic intestinal worms, amebic cysts or germs of intestinal diseases, such as cause bowel complaint, diarrhea, dysentery or typhoid fever, may be present in the water, thus endangering the health of persons drinking the water. The analytical terms and results are briefly explained as follows:

Physical and Chemical Tests: "Sediment" through "Chloride." A desirable water has an attractive appearance (no sediment or turbidity) and has no objectionable odor or taste. Chemical results are given in parts per million (ppm).

Bacteriological Tests: "Bacteria per ml." indicates the number of microorganisms present in one milliliter (ml.) of water (20 drops) and the number which grew in standard nutrient agar at body temperature (37°C or 98.6°F). These bacteria may not be of intestinal origin and therefore may not be of sanitary importance. Occasionally the test plates are overcrowded so that no bacterial count can be obtained. In such a case the report shows "Innumerable" indicating more than 10,000 bacteria per ml.

"Coli-type bacteria" "Presumptive Tests" "Confirmatory Tests": A water containing bacteria of intestinal origin (*E. coli* and *A. aerogenes*, also known as "coliform" bacteria), if placed in a sugar broth (lactose), will cause fermentation and production of gas in 24 or 48 hrs. By means of further laboratory tests the presence of these bacteria in 10 ml. portions is indicated by a +, their absence by a—. The numeral preceding the sign shows the number of portions giving that result.

Example: 2+3— indicates that two 10 ml. portions of the sample did show and three portions did not show coli-type bacteria present.

After receipt of the sample in the laboratory it requires from two to six days to complete the sanitary or bacteriological analysis.

Based on an inspection of the sanitary facilities at the Dunker Hill Grade and High School, District #164, Macoupin County, made on July 15, 1942, we conclude that the water supply at the school is subject to contamination:

a. In the dug well on the Pyle property that is cross-connected with the distribution system supplying the Bunker Hill public water supply at the school; by shallow ground water seepage which may enter through cracks that can develop in the brick well lining; by rain, waste pumpage, dust, bird and dog contamination which may enter the well through cracks in and around the boards which support the pump; by dust, bird and dog contamination that may be washed into the well through the crack in the split-base pump; by seepage of sewage pollution from the sewer tile which is located within about 25 feet of the well that may saturate the soil around the sewer and eventually enter the well; by seepage of pollitional material from the cellar drain tile which is within about 40 feet of the well, that may saturate the soil around the tile and eventually enter the well; by contaminated waste pumpage which will saturate the ground surrounding the well and which may re-enter it.

b. In the distribution system by polluted water from the dug well on the Pyle property which is cross-connected with the distribution system supplying the Bunker Hill public water supply to the school, that may be back-siphoned into the potable water system through this cross connection, or by polluted water that may be back-siphoned into the potable water system from any of the various improperly constructed plumbing fixtures, if the pressure should drop in the public water supply mains because of a high fire demand, a leak in the system, or for other reasons. The cistern on the school grounds may possibly be cross-connected with the potable supply also. If this is the case, the potable supply is subject to contamination by back-siphonage of improperly filtered cistern water also.

The following plumbing defects, referred to above, were found to exist: The lavatories have the water inlets flush with or below the spill lines of the fixtures; the toilet flush boxes and urinal flush box are not provided with proper siphon-breaker ball-cocks; the drinking fountains have the water inlets submerged below the rims of the bowls. The Bunker Hill public water supply at the school is subject to contamination by back-siphonage of polluted water from these fixtures having submerged water inlets. Such back-siphonage could occur at any time when any one of these inlets is submerged, if the pressure should drop in the water main as a result of a high fire demand, a leak in the system, or for other reasons.

Enclosed is the result of analysis of a sample collected during the inspection from the dug well on the Pyle property, which analysis showed the water in the well was con-

aminated and not safe for drinking at that time. This contamination was very likely introduced into the well because of one of the above mentioned defects.

In order to correct these sanitary defects at the school and make the water supply assuredly safe for drinking purposes we recommend the following improvements:

1. Break the cross-connection between the improperly protected dug well on the Pyle property and the potable water supply in the basement of the school building by removing a section of the connecting pipe. There should be no physical connection between a potable water supply and a supply of questionable quality. Inasmuch as the Hunker Hill public water supply is adequate for all school needs and is regularly inspected and tested by this Department, there appears to be no reason why the dug well supply need be maintained. If it is found necessary to maintain this well supply, however, it should be improved in accordance with details outlined in the enclosed well bulletin.
2. Remove the cross-connection between the cistern supply and the potable water supply by removing a section of the connecting pipe, if such a cross-connection is found to exist.
3. Change all submerged lavatory inlets so that the water inlet orifices will be located at least one inch above the maximum spill lines of the fixtures.
4. Provide all toilet flush boxes and urinal flush boxes with accepted siphon-breaker ballcocks, installed so that the air inlets are located at least one inch above the maximum overflow lines in the tanks. A list of accepted ballcocks is enclosed for your convenience.
5. Replace the drinking fountains, or change the existing fountains so that the jets will issue at an angle from completely guarded inlets located above the maximum spill lines of the bowls.

Since the school officials are responsible for the protection of the health of the pupils while they are at school, it is important that the above recommendations be fulfilled.

If the engineers of this Department can be of service in connection with your water supply or sewerage problems, we shall be pleased to be so advised. We shall appreciate an acknowledgment of this letter and information regarding the action taken toward following the above recommendations.
