The above analysis indicates that this water was contaminated and was not safe to drink when the sample was collected.

The contamination may be due to waste pumpage or to surface water seeping back through cracks in the platform or through the upper part of the well lining. The well should be reconstructed as follows:
(1) Pour a 6-inch concrete wall around the outside of the present well lining to a depth of 8 feet.
(2) Build a nev concrete platform, inserting an iron pipe sleeve so that it will extend one-half inch above the concrete and into the pump base when the pump is installed, as illustrated in the bulletin.

The location of the well can be considered safe only if the distances and construction of cesspools, privy vaults, sewers and drains comply with the recommendations in the enclosed bulletin.

When the well is properly located and improved as outlined above and in our bulletin, it should deliver a water of safe sanitary quality.

This analysis indicates that the water was contaminated and was not safe to drink at the time the sample was collected.

The well appears to be subject to contamination caused by shallow ground water and rain seeping through the upper portion of the well lining. Also dust, dog and bird contamination may bo washed under the pump base and through the manhole into the well. Therefore, we recommend that the well be reconstructed as follows:

1. Pour a six-inch reinforced concrete wall around the outside of the present well lining to a depth of 8 feet, or remove the old lining and build a proper form in which to pour the concrete. (See bulletin.)
2. Build 3 new reinforced concrete platform, inserting an iron pipe sleeve in the concrete, underneath the pump base and extending into the pump base at least an inch, as illustrated in the bulletin.
3. After the above repairs axe made the well should be sterilized with chlorimated lime as outlined on page 11 of our bulletin on wells.

Unless these improvements are made the well cannot be considered a satisfactory source of drinking water.

In the case of school wells where there is considerable waste pumpage, a pipe or concrete gutter should be provided to carry waste water to a distance of 12 or 15 feet from the well before discharging it upon the surface of the ground. pop karl Kerstein, Carlinville

## NOTES TO TEACHERS AND DIRECTORS

Sec. 187. The Schedule, or Schedules, shall be delivered to one of the Directors, who shall, if requested, give the teacher a feceipt for the same. It shall be the duty of the Director to examine carefully such Schedule, or Schedules, with at least one other Disector, and correct any errors, and if such Schedule has been made according to law, they shall certify to the same.

Sec. 81. The Township Treasurer shall pay out no funds of any school district except upon an order of the Board of Directors, signed by the President and Clerk, or by a majority of the Board. When an order issued for the wages of a Teacher is presented to the Treasurer and is not paid for want of funds, the Treasurer shall endorse it over his signature, "not paid for want of funds" with the date of presentation, and shall make and keep a record of such endorsement. Such order shall thereafter draw interest at the legal rate until paid, or until the Treasurer shall notify the Clerk in writing that he has funds to pay such order, and the Treasurer shall make and keep a record of such notices, and hold the funds necessary to pay such order until it is presented. Such order shall draw no interest after notice is given to the Clerk,

SEc. 188. The school month shall be the same as the calendar month. But a Teacher shall not be required to teach on Saturdays or legal schood holidays, whic a are the first day of January, the fourth day of July, the twenty-fifth day of December, and any day appointed by the President or Governor as a day of fast or thanksgiving, and no deduction shall be made from the time or compensation of a Teacher on account of such days.

SEc. 186. In all districts controlled by a Board of Directors, Teachers shall make schedules of the names of all pupils attending school, in the form prescribed by this Act, and when pupils reside in two or more districts, townships or counties, separate schedules shall be kept for each district, township or county. . Boards of Education may require Teachers to make schedules, or Statements certifying the number of days' attendance for each month, as shown by their registers, which shall be certified by the Board of Education, and be subject to the same requirements as schedules. Schedules shall be certified by the Teacher.
