This reporting sheet corresponds to a page of your Classification Register (not Attendance Register); please fill it out with ink from your Classification Register and return to me at the end of the last month of the term. It will be kept for public inspection. Study the plan given below and follow it accurately. If you have not a Classification Register in your School let me know at once; also inform the President of your School Board or your Director.

The Register can be obtained at the County Superintendent's office.

Please endeavor to have a Register provided for your school at once, so that all the schools may be classified before the end of the term.

How to Classify Your School in the Classification Register.

1st. Read the course of study carefully; notice the number of grades and the work that each grade includes.

2d. Ascertain in which grade of the Course each pupil has most of his work, and classify him in that grade. If he has not all of his studies in this grade, mark the grade in which such other studies are found, under the headings for these respective studies. (See sample form in Register.)

3d. When a pupil has completed a study and passed a satisfactory examination, credit him with it in the column of "Studies Completed this Term," also record it in the "Record of Studies Completed," in the back part of the Register. This record should show every study which each pupil completes, until he finishes the course and graduates from the district school. The graduating of classes is one of the greatest incentives that can be used in keeping pupils from "dropping out" of school. Diplomas for graduation will be furnished by the County Superintendent for all pupils who finish the course of study.

4th. The "Syllabus of Classes" shows every class in each study, and the pupils (indicated by numbers) belonging to it, also the pages canvassed by each class during the term. The names of pupils belonging to each class may be found by referring to the names, corresponding to each number, in the column of "Names of Pupils."

5th. The first classification of any school is the most difficult, and should be made with much care. Succeeding teachers should not change the classification left by their predecessors without good reason.

6th. The classification as left by each teacher should show the status of each pupil at the close of each term each being classified in the grade which he has just finished.

7th. A pupil changing from one school to any other in which this Register is used, may receive from his teacher a certificate of his standing, which will enable the teacher whose school he enters to classify him without examination.

8th. Certificates of Promotion and Monthly Reports to Parents may be found to be valuable helps.

9th. Be just and fair in your markings, neither too high nor too low, so as to avoid clashing of opinion by successive teachers.

April 10th, while visiting the high school to find out about one of the crippled children, I decided it would be a good thing to make an inspection of your elementary school.

As I entered the building the first thing that impressed me was the fact that the building seemed to be clean, and I am glad to say to the board of directors that we found it in good condition all the way through in regard to cleanliness.

The second thing that impressed me was the good order which was evident as the children marched into their classrooms after the recess period. There seemed to be no lack of order about it but all of the children were very orderly; so much so that it attracted my attention.

The inspection was very brief but in one of the rooms we saw some very fine review work in Arithmetic. I was told by your superintendent, Miss Tongate, that that sort of work is being carried on in all of the grades. This I count a very excellent thing. Children are not put back in their work but they are asked to give a little attention each day in reviewing some of the back work. If this plan is followed for a few years there can be no doubt about the big advantage to your entire school by the time the children leave the eighth grade.

In all of the rooms visited we found excellent order and good work. I do not know of a system of schools that I visited that had a finer spirit and more progressive work than your school. I wish to commend the board of directors, your superintendent, Miss Nellie Tongate, teachers and children. You are having a very successful school.

Dear Sirs:

Today your County Superintendent Mr. Wilhite and I visited your school. As usual we were much pleased with your school. Miss Tongate, for very excellent reasons, was not present but the other teachers were conducting the work of the school in very good order. From previous observations and from recent information, I know that Miss Tongate is giving good direction and leadership to the work of your school. Your teachers and pupils are responding finely.

I make these suggestions:

- (1) I commend you for having so good a janitor. He keeps the building clean and he cares for the floors in such a manner as to retain the fine natural color of the wood.
- (2) Some of the blinds are in very bad condition and should be replaced at the earliest date to protect the eyes of children and teachers.
- (3) When you decorate again please use the light colors - light cream on the ceilings and light tan on the walls. The green colors are not good.
- (4) A school so large as yours and so good as yours should have inside water toilets for the use of children and teachers. I am certain you could make plans to install them in the basement.
- (5) The teachers of the first three grades need another set of supplementary readers for the children to use in their reading work.
- (6) There is need of more material for busy work and hand work.

I commend you for having dictionaries, Pupils' Reading Circle books, reference books, work books and other supplies needed by the teachers in serving your children.

When you make improvements or purchase supplies please confer with Mr. Wilhite as he can help you to secure correct service.

Dear Miss Tongate:

On December 9, in company with County Superintendent Kerstein, I visited your school. I have the following report to make, which I hope will serve as a guide for further improvement:

You have a good building which has been kept in a good state of repair. The windows in some of the rooms are not as well placed as they might be, but you have supplemented the natural lighting by means of an excellent system of artificial lighting. It was noted that each room has four large semi-indirect lights of 300 watts each. All four lights in each room are on one switch. It would have been better to have had each pair on a separate switch. The large room has six lights, three on each switch. This is a better arrangement. I feel that the lighting engineer who made your light appraisal made an error in placing so many strong lights in the halls where they are not needed. The wiring of these hall lights is also open to question. It is very inconvenient if stairway lights are not on a three-way switch. It was observed that, although the rooms were dark on the day of our visit, the teachers were not using the lights because of the expense of electric current. It seems to me that the school board should realize that it is rather useless to have a good lighting system unless it is used when needed. Electric current will cost money, but the use of the lights will mean lightsaving on the part of the pupils.

Your school is very well equipped with instructional aids. You have new bulletin boards, and I suggest that tack strip be added. I was pleased to note the new encyclopedia recently purchased for the fifth and sixth grades. You have good libraries, but some of the books are too advanced for elementary school pupils. I suggest that the books in your library which are suited to the high school level be removed from your library and donated to the high school.

I was pleased to note that you have expanded your curriculum to provide clothing and foods for the girls and agriculture for the boys. The oil stoves used for the foods course are somewhat insanitary and also dangerous. If the electric rate is not too high, it might be well to provide electric hot plates. It is unfortunate that your school does not have indoor toilets.

The salaries paid in this school are rather low, although you have nine months of school. Some of your teachers have had two or more years of training. Others have had less. The record for recent summer school attendance and extension work is very good.

This school ranks high in most of the items of our rating scale. The main building deficiency is lack of indoor toilets. Equipment needs are very well met, although I do not recall seeing any hygiene charts. The curriculum offerings are commendable. The salaries are rather low and there is a shortage of training of some of the teachers. Within another year or two I feel certain that this school can improve in the items mentioned so that it will easily merit Superior Rating. If the lack of indoor toilets were the only deficiency I would be willing to recommend this school for Superior Rating. Since this school was Recognized last year, and definite improvements have been made since that time, I am very happy to renew the Certificate of Recognition for the school year 1937-38.

Gentlemen:

Based on an inspection of the sanitary facilities at Palmyra School Dist. #35, Macoupin County made July 27, 1938 we conclude that the following sanitary defects exist:

a) The well is subject to contamination by shallow ground water seepage which may enter through cracks that can develop in the brick well lining; rain, waste purpase, dust, bird and dog contamination which may enter the well through cracks in and around the boards which support the pump; dust, bird and dog contamination that may be washed into the well through cracks in the split-base pump; contaminated waste purpase which will saturate the ground surrounding the well and which may re-enter it.

b) The privies are insanitary as they are accessible to flies, insects and rodents because of the open-back type of vaults, the unscreened vents, the non-self closing lids.

In order to correct these sanitary defects at the school, we recommend the following improvements:

1. Pour a 6 inch reinforced concrete wall around the outside of the present well lining to a depth of at least 3 feet below the surrounding ground surface. Directions for such construction are shown on page 8 of the enclosed bulletin.

2. Reconstruct the well platform with a 4 inch concrete slab extending beyond the walls at least one foot in all directions. A short iron pipe sleeve, whose diameter will allow the passage of the pump cylinder, should be placed in the platform at the time of construction. Sleeve should extend about one inch into the pump base. The pump should rest directly on the concrete and be firmly bolted in place. This is shown in Fig. 6 of the enclosed bulletin.

3. Replace the split-base pump with a pump having a one piece circular base. If considered economical, the directors may choose to have the split-base welded together so that there will be no openings in the base.

4. Provide a substantial, water tight trough 15 feet in length to carry waste purpase away from the immediate vicinity of the well.

5. Sterilize the well water after the above improvements have been made and before it is used for drinking purposes. The procedure for sterilization is described on pages 16 and 17 of the enclosed bulletin.

6. Seal the open-back on the vaults so that they will be absolutely flytight. This can be done by placing a tight fitting wood cover over the back and then backfilling with earth.

7. Provide the privies with hinged, self-closing lids. These lids when closed should fit so as to exclude flies.

8. Screen the vents with 16 mesh copper screen wire to prevent the entrance of flies.

Since the school officials are responsible for the protection of the pupils' while at school, it is important that the above recommendations be fulfilled.

If the engineer of this department can be of service in connection with your water supply or sewerage problems, we shall be pleased to be so advised.

Gentlemen:

On December 23, 1941, an inspection of the new dug well and a re-inspection of the other sanitary facilities was made at the Palmyra Grade School, District #25, Macoupin County. From this inspection we conclude that the following sanitary defects exist;

- a. The dug well near the road, south of the school, which is not used as a source of drinking water, is subject to contamination because of various defects in construction. This is a health hazard because uninformed persons or children may drink from this well at any time.
- b. The privies are insanitary as the pits are accessible to flies, insects and rodents because of the non-selfclosing seat covers; the open cracks in the vaults around the bases of the buildings; the un-screened vents.

The inspection of the well used for supplying drinking water, together with information secured at the time of the inspection, indicate that the well is apparently properly protected against entrance of outside contamination. However, the result of analysis of a sample of water collected during the inspection, a copy of which is enclosed, showed that the water was partially contaminated and not entirely safe for drinking at that time. Pollution may have been introduced into the well at the time water was hauled and put into the well. Or possibly, paint or oil in the pump or suction pipe may account for contamination shown in this sample.

In order to correct these sanitary defects at the school, we recommend the following improvements;

1. Keep the handle of the pump in the well near the road chained and padlocked at all times, or ~~remove~~ the pump handle bolt.

1.

2. Provide selfclosing seat covers for all privy seats.
3. Seal all openings into the privy vaults in an absolutely fly-tight manner.
4. Screen the privy vents with 16 mesh copper screen wire.
5. Disinfect the well furnishing the drinking water supply with a solution of chlorinated lime prepared as outlined in the enclosed leaflet. The walls of the well should be thoroughly washed down with the solution and the latter allowed to remain in the well over night. The pump should be operated several times in order to disinfect the pump and suction pipe. The following day the well should be pumped out until the taste of chlorine has disappeared. If you will notify us after this has been done another sample will be collected.

Since the school officials are responsible for the protection of the health of the pupils while they are at school, it is important that the above recommendations be fulfilled.

If you do not clearly understand the above recommendations or you wish to use equivalent methods for correcting the existing defects, please contact this office. A few minutes spent discussing the matter will clear up any difficulties and will avoid any costly mistakes.

We shall appreciate an acknowledgement of this letter and information regarding the action taken toward following the above recommendations.

From an analytical standpoint this water was reasonably safe for drinking purposes at the time the sample was collected.

In spite of these results the well cannot be considered a satisfactory source of drinking water because it is not adequately protected against contamination. Under different conditions of temperature and rainfall we believe that the water would not be safe to drink. We recommend, therefore, that the well be reconstructed as follows.

1. Pour a six-inch concrete wall around the outside of the present well lining to a depth of 8 feet. (See bulletin.)
2. Build a new concrete platform, inserting an iron pipe sleeve in the concrete, underneath the pump base, and extending into the pump base at least an inch, as illustrated in the bulletin.

No privy vaults should be allowed to exist within 75 feet and any sewers or sink drains passing within 40 feet should be constructed from cast iron soil pipe with leaded joints.

If the well is improved as outlined in our bulletin it should deliver a water of good sanitary quality.

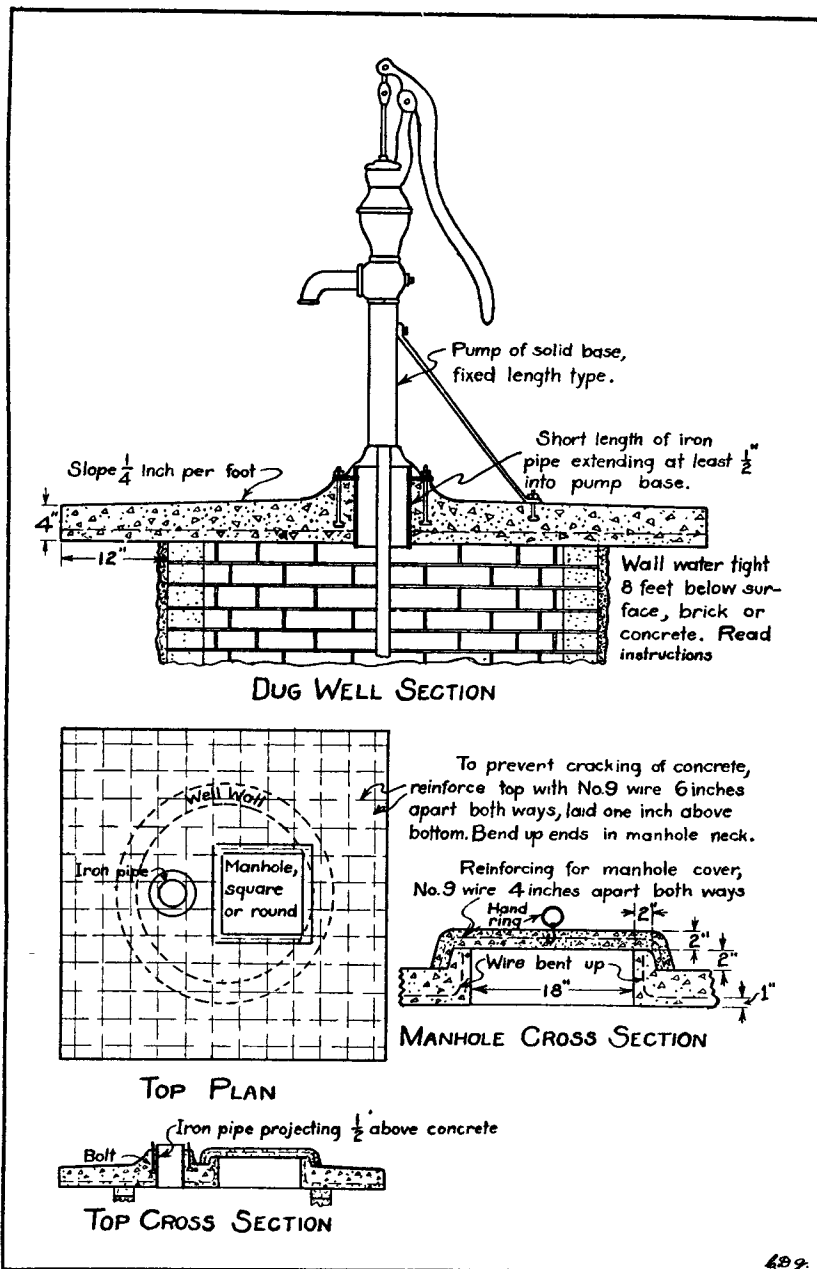

insert one wire extending around neck about one inch from the top. When concrete has set, place form for sides and bottom of manhole cover, protect concrete surface of well top and neck, with tar paper or gunny sack, pour concrete, reinforcing with No. 9 wire 4 inches apart both ways as in drawing. When concrete cover has set, it may be removed easily, the tar paper preventing adherence to the top and manhole neck.

A ventilator upon a dug well is unnecessary, may cause pollution, and none should be built.

Analyses.

Water analyses are made by the Department of Health without charge. Samples must be collected in department containers.

Location and Construction for a Safe Water.

Carl D. Gross, Supervisor of Rural Sanitation.

Private and semi-public wells used as sources of water for drinking or domestic purposes should always be so located and constructed as to continually yield a safe water. Because many such wells, with the increasing auto travel, are being used by a great many instead of only a few people it is more important than ever that such wells be satisfactory. A polluted private well in days gone by might cause illness only among the family of the owner, but now it might, if used by the auto traveller, spread typhoid or dysentery hundreds of miles. It costs but little or no more to construct and maintain a safe well than one subject to pollution. Why invite illness and gamble with death?

A water can be safe and yet not clean. Drinking water should be both clean and safe. Therefore, the well should be free from any and all kinds of contamination. Proper location will avoid underground contamination such as drainage from a privy vault. Proper construction will avoid both underground and surface contamination such as filth from shoes or animals or surface water.

Location of Well.

Drainage. The well should be located so that drainage will be away from and not toward it.

Privy vaults should be at least 50 feet (preferably 100 feet) and **cesspools** at least 75 feet from the well. **Sewers or sink drains** passing within 50 feet should be built with cast-iron pipe or with glazed-tile pipe with cemented joints.

Barnyards, etc., should preferably be 50 feet or more from the well and should be on the downward slope from the well.

Construction of Well.

The wall should be water-tight to a depth of 8 feet or more below the ground surface in order to exclude contaminated shallow ground water. Double-ring, 8-inch wall of dense brick laid in Portland cement with one inch of cement on the exterior or between rings, and horizontal and vertical joints staggered, or a 6-inch reinforced Portland cement concrete wall is satisfactory. Tile or single-ring brick walls alone are not satisfactory.

If the wall is not water-tight, bacterial analyses will show pollution at certain seasons, the water may contain small white worms, or may taste and smell bad after the well has stood idle for weeks.

The top should be of water-tight concrete and at least one foot above the surrounding ground level. The concrete should be one part cement, 1½ parts sand, and 3 parts gravel; not less than 4 inches in thickness; and should extend one foot beyond the well wall in all directions. The concrete must be reinforced with steel to insure it against cracking. Lengths of No. 9 fencing wire placed 6 inches apart both lengthwise and crosswise of cover, as shown on the diagram, or ¾-inch steel rods 9 inches apart both ways, or enough steel, mesh or heavy woven wire may be used.

A manhole is not necessary but if one is desired it should be built to exclude all waste water. The sides of the opening should extend 2 inches above the well top and the cover should be water-tight with overhanging edges extending down to the well top. If a proper type of iron manhole frame and cover cannot be purchased, a concrete manhole as shown on the drawing may easily be built. Forms must be used for both the inside and outside of the manhole neck. Extra steel reinforcing should be placed across the well top at the manhole sides.

The pump opening through the well top should be formed by a pipe sleeve which will extend above the well top and into the pump base and thus exclude waste pumpage and rain water which might otherwise wash into the well, filth from shoes, animals, etc., carried onto the well top. Gaskets or other packing if used eventually become loose and, therefore, are unsatisfactory. A piece of iron pipe, large enough to admit the well cylinder, should be placed in the well top to serve as a pipe sleeve, preferably when being poured, and should extend at least one-half inch above the top and into the pump base.

Hand pumps should be of fixed lengths with one-piece base to fit over the pipe sleeve in the well-top opening. (See drawing.)

Construction of top. For wells greater than 4 feet in diameter the top will be almost too heavy to move and probably should be constructed in place on the well. Small tops may be made and then placed on the walls provided that fresh cement is placed between the walls and top to make a tight joint.

Construct wooden form, sides 4 inches or more high. Place iron pipe (pipe sleeve) for pump opening on the form floor. If manhole is desired, place form for inside of manhole. Mix 1:1½:3 concrete of jelly consistency, pour it one inch thick upon form floor, packing it well around the pipe sleeve, manhole and all sides. Lay steel reinforcing properly spaced in both directions upon the concrete surface. The steel should be bent up at openings and extend to within one-half inch of top of concrete as shown in drawing. Pour remainder of concrete, trowel surface slopes and raised portion for pump base, allowing iron pipe sleeve to extend one-half inch above concrete. Embed bolts for pump base in proper place by means of a wooden pattern of pump base. Lay outside form for manhole neck, fill space with concrete,
