I want to congratulate you on the way you have kept your school on the recognized list. You have made a number of improvements in the school, such as painting and electric lights, which I am sure the community appreciates. On the whole, your school is pretty well equipped. I might mention, however, that a water fountain for use during cold weather would be a help. Your teacher could use a duplicating machine of some kind. The floors should be cleaned and then varnished and waxed when you get the money, as this will make it look more homelike and it will be easier to keep clean. The inside of the building could be redecorated, as the walls are not very clean. You have a good clock but it needs repairing. I hope you will always order the Pupils Reading Circle Books from the State Department, especially for the grades that you have in school. These are the cheapest and best books that you can buy.

Gentlemen:

Engineer J. T. Robinson has reported on his inspection of the sanitary facilities at Centerview School, District #33, Macoupin County, made July 19, 1939 and we conclude from his report that the following sanitary defects exist:

a) The well is subject to contamination by shallow ground water seepage which may enter through cracks that can develop in the brick well lining; rain, waste pumpage, dust, bird and dog contamination which may enter the well through cracks in and around the boards which support the pump; dust, bird and dog contamination that may be washed into the well through cracks in the split-base pump; contaminated waste pumpage which will saturate the ground surrounding the well and which may re-enter it; dirt, waste pumpage, etc that may seep or wash into the well through cracks in the platform.

In order to correct these sanitary defects at the school we recommend the following improvements:

1. Pour a 6 inch reinforced concrete wall around the outside of the present well lining to a depth of at least 8 feet below the surrounding ground surface. Directions for such construction are shown on page 6 of the enclosed bulletin.

2. Reconstruct the well platform with a 4 inch concrete slab extending beyond the walls at least one foot in all directions. A short iron pipe sleeve, whose diameter will allow the passage of the pump cylinder, should be placed in the platform at the time of construction. Sleeve should extend about one inch into the pump base. The pump should rest directly on the concrete and be firmly bolted in place. This is shown in Fig. 6 of the enclosed bulletin.

3. Replace the split-base pump with a pump having a one piece circular base, and a stuffing box surrounding the pump rod.

4. Provide a substantial, water tight trough 15 feet in length to carry waste pumpage away from the immediate vicinity of the well.

5. Sterilize the well water after the above improvements have been made and before it is used for drinking purposes. The procedure for sterilization is described on pages 16 and 17 of the enclosed bulletin.

Since the school officials are responsible for the protection of the pupils' health while at school, it is important that the above recommendations be fulfilled.

If the engineers of this department can be of service in connection with your water supply or sewerage problems, we shall be pleased to be so advised.
