The graduating of classes is one of the greatest incentives that can be used in keeping pupils from "dropping out" of school. Diplomas for graduation will be furnished by the County Superintendent for all pupils who finish the course of study.

4th. The "Syllabus of Classes" shows every class in each study, and the pupils (indicated by numbers) belonging to it, also the pages canvassed by each class during the term. The names of pupils belonging to each class may be found by referring to the names, corresponding to each number, in the column of "Names of Pupils."

Gentlemen:

On the fourteenth of January I visited the East Fairview School, District #49. Your teacher, Miss Marjorie Denby, is well qualified for her work. She is an excellent teacher, and you no doubt appreciate her value in your school, as you have reemployed her a number of years in succession. I hope that you will be able to raise her salary so that she will remain in your school, as experienced teachers are greatly in demand.

I want to congratulate you upon the manner in which you have kept your school on the recognized list. On the whole, your school is very well equipped. However, there are a few things which I might mention that you could do when you get the money. You have an old set of reference books which are still usable, but if you would purchase a new set of Compton's Encyclopedia or World Books it would be a great help to your children. As the state department is emphasizing the teaching of health, a set of physiology charts would be very useful.

Your floors are in bad shape. If they were resanded and sealed and varnished or waxed, it would make the room much more attractive. You are in need of a first aid kit, and a small fire extinguisher, which could be purchased from your local hardware firm. If you get electricity in the neighborhood, it would be nice to put in electric lights. A drinking fountain inside the building for use during bad weather would be a big help, as children drink more water in bad weather if there is a fountain available in the room.
