Resources on Culturally Responsive Teaching and Leading Standards

Illinois adopted Culturally Responsive Teaching and Leading Standards today - February 17. The standards come from research-based best practices for closing achievement gaps. Cultural responsiveness improves student outcomes across a range of indicators from math and reading scores, to attendance, to postsecondary enrollment. The standards encourage future teachers to engage in self -reflection, to get to know their students' families, to connect the curriculum to students' lives, and to support student leadership.

State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen I. Ayala issued a statement about the standards and addressed why the standards are so important in her Feb. 2 Weekly Message column.

HELP KIDS UNDERSTAND BULLYING

<u>Kids who know</u> what bullying is can better identify it. They can talk about bullying if it happens to them or others. Kids need to know ways to safely stand up to bullying and how to get help.



- Encourage kids to speak to a trusted adult if they are bullied or see others being bullied. The adult can give comfort, support, and advice, even if they can't solve the problem directly.
- Encourage the child to <u>report bullying</u> if it happens.
- Talk about how to stand up to kids who bully. Give tips, like using humor and saying "stop" directly and confidently. Talk about what to do if those actions don't work, like walking away.
- Talk about strategies for staying safe, such as staying near adults or groups of other kids.
- Urge them to <u>help kids who are bullied</u> by showing kindness or getting help.
- Watch the short <u>webisodes</u> and <u>discuss them PDF</u> with kids.

What Can Be Learned from Great Business, Military, Political, Social & Sports Leaders Presented by Don Kachur Administrator Academy 1782

Live on-line or recorded: April 28, 2021- 9 a.m.- 2:30 p.m. with a one hour lunch break

This leadership course will help participants review the characteristics of effective leadership, analyze the principles of leadership used by recognized leaders within business, military, political, social issues, and sports, and prepare a Developmental Application Plan to achieve success within their own educational setting.

Participants will be able to review leadership skills and qualities as demonstrated by leaders from the fields of business, military, politics, social issues, and sports, and be able to reflect upon the meaning and the application of those leadership principles and attributes to 21st century real life school situations (PERA-teacher evaluation, school improvement, staff training and retention, motivating students and staff, parental involvement, and technology challenges).

For those participants seeking Administrator Academy credit, they will create a Developmental Application Plan utilizing leadership skills and qualities reviewed in the course to address one major educational issue (e.g., school culture, school improvement, professional development, supporting teacher leaders, increasing parental involvement) needing attention in their school setting. This course is an updated version of AA #224 Developing Leadership Principles through the Study of Great Leaders.

Who should attend: Teachers, principals, district office staff and any educator interested in learning leadership skills.

This 6 hour Administrative Academy or PD Hours will involve 4.5 hours of live on-line sessions and a total of 1.5 hour of pre-reading and follow up planning.

Mandated Reporting: Its OUR Responsibility

On January 1, 2020, significant changes to the Illinois mandated reporter law took effect for addressing child abuse and neglect issues. These changes are particularly important for all persons who care for children, such as in houses of worship, schools, and social service organizations.

<u>Anyone</u> who suspects child abuse, neglect or is concerned about the health or safety of a child, should call the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services Child Abuse Hotline to make a report - but **Mandated Reporters** are required by law to do so.

Mandated reporters are also required to review ISBE and DCFS materials about these reporting duties at least once a year. If you want to clarify or refresh your understanding of your role as a mandated reporter, DCFS also offers a free online on-demand training course entitled Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse: Training for Mandated Reporters.
